Dear Friends,

After 29 years of unwavering, faithful, and matchless service, our esteemed and beloved Organist and Choirmaster, James Busby, has decided to retire from his work at S. Stephen's at the end of June. Soon after I was called as your new Rector in the summer of 2020, James reached out to me over the phone to introduce himself. At the end of the call he said "Well, is there anything else I can do for you?" Knowing that he had been there for many years, I said without pausing "Yes -- don't retire any time soon!" However, I knew this day might come sooner than later.

James does not do anything by half-measures. As hard as he puts the choir through their paces, he is also fiercely loyal as a friend and colleague. He knows instinctively how much of a ministry the music program is, and there are many people now active in the life of S. Stephen's Church who came to it initially through the choir. I was profoundly touched when I was going through the Parish Register in my first year and saw the entries of two baptisms -- both choir members -- and James as their sponsor.

James has been both a wonderful colleague to me and a cherished friend: I cannot count the number of times in the weeks following my disastrous injury that James came to the house to take me to the church on Sundays or during the work week, or arranged for a choir member to pick me up when he could not. As to his contributions to the musical life of our parish and in Boston, the esteem and affection in which he is held by all those who have worked with him says far more than any words of mine can. I look forward to celebrating his time among us and showering him with accolades in the coming months. His final Sunday with the Choir will be on the feast of Corpus Christi, and on that day we will celebrate his time here with a special service and festive reception.

Until that time, please join me in expressing gratitude and affection for all James' years of service to our parish, and for the sublime moments of transcendent beauty we've experienced through his music.
